**CLIMATE CHANGE IMPACTS ON TEXAS WATER 2008
APPLICABLE POLICIES FOR EXHIBITING
IN THE CAPITOL AND CAPITOL EXTENSION**

DEFINITIONS.

- (1) **Exhibition**—Any display of artwork, including paintings, sculptures, arts and crafts; photographs; public service and general interest presentations; and historical displays.
- (2) **Public Purpose**—the promotion of public health, education, safety, morals, general welfare, security, and prosperity of all of the inhabitants or residents within the state, the sovereign powers of which are exercised to promote such public purpose or public business. The chief test of what constitutes a public purpose is that the public generally must have a direct interest in the purpose and the community at large is to be benefited. This does not include activities which promote specific viewpoint or issue and could be considered lobbying. Political rallies, receptions, and campaign activities are prohibited in the public areas of the Capitol.

APPLICABLE CRITERIA FOR EXHIBITION APPROVAL

- (1) Exhibitions must be for a public purpose as defined in section (a)(3) of this section.
- (2) All exhibits must be free-standing. Art and photographic exhibits must be secured to tripods, backdrops, or free-standing displays.
- (3) Exhibits will not be considered for approval if they:
 - a) promote a commercial enterprise or involve the exchange of money; or
 - b) have no obvious public purpose.
